1. School Counseling Services

a. All Glenbard North students receive the services of a school counselor. Counselors work with students throughout their four years and assist them with their transition into high school, planning an educational program, personal issues, and academic, college and career needs.

2. Study Hall Resource

- a. Students who are enrolled in a study hall and failing classes are directed to receive additional support from a certified teacher during their study hall.
- b. Two times a week during assigned session (session = 2 weeks) in room 2100.

3. G.O.A.L.S. - Lunch Intervention Program

a. Guided Organizational and Learning Strategies, or GOALS, is a mandatory intervention provided to students who are failing 2-3 classes. GOALS meets during the first half of a student's lunch period (24 minutes). During this 10 week program, regardless of skill focus, students receive direct instruction, goal setting skills and mentorship through Check and Connect as well as study skills strategies. Students are progress monitored on a weekly basis using their grade point average (GPA), as well as their self-set goals, which they set and monitor with a mentor. GOALS meets in room 1408.

4. Math Intervention - The Quad

- a. Peer tutors can help with Algebra, Geometry, and Algebra 2 with Trigonometry.
- b. Every day of the week during the lunch periods.
- c. The Quad is located in room 1410.

5. Math Resource Center

a. Math Resource is a program in which students can receive assistance in math courses ranging from Algebra to Calculus. It is staffed by certified math teachers and is available to students before, during, and after school Monday-Friday in room 2120.

6. The Write Place

a. The Write Place is a student-staffed writing center where students can come to receive support at any point during the writing process. Students work 1:1 with a high performing, trained writing tutor. The Write Place is open during all lunch periods. Students meet in room 1406.

7. Science Peer Tutoring

a. Room 2100 during lunch periods & Room 2228 after school

8. World Language Peer Tutoring

a. Tuesday & Thursday after school in room 2237

9. Rebound- Tutoring for athletes

a. Monday & Thursday after school in room 1565

10. ELL Homework Club

- a. Students enrolled in the ELL program are invited to join ELL Homework Club. This club provides a quiet, structured before school environment in which ELL students can work on homework and projects while having support from our ELL staff.
- b. Meeting times are Monday-Friday: 6:30am-7:25am in room 1121.

11.STRIVE

a. Success Through Reaching Individual Expectations: STRIVE provides a quiet, structured after school environment in which students can work on homework and projects while having the availability for targeted assistance by members of our teaching staff. Students meet in room 2100.

12. PASS

a. PASS provides after school tutoring and homework assistance offered through our special education department for students with an IEP. Parents and students can learn more about the PASS program through the student's case manager or special education department chair. Students meet in room 1414.

13. Testing Center

a. Room 2214

14. Link Leader

a. Juniors and seniors are peer mentors for freshmen and assist with transitioning into high school.
