School Safety Drills:

There is nothing more important to us at Glenbard North than your child's safety each day. We complete all required drills annually to ensure that students understand their role in the event of an emergency. This year we have already completed two fire drills, a lockdown drill, and viewed our annual safety video. As you know, we also completed an off-site evacuation drill in September to Fountain View Recreation Center. We evacuated the school as part of a fire drill, and then moved off-site to Fountain View, took attendance accounting for all students, and then returned to North. Although this is a large undertaking, it is very important that our students are familiar with procedures such as an off-site evacuation. Our students and staff were outstanding during the drill and we are very grateful to the Carol Stream Police Department, the Fountain View Recreation Center staff, the Carol Stream Fire Department, and the staff at Heritage Presbyterian Church for their assistance.

A message from the Superintendent

Communicates: a key competency of Profile of a Graduate

Recently, we launched our Profile of a Graduate - a multi-faceted transformative movement that underscores six competencies that we want every graduate to embody. Our Profile of a Graduate includes the following competencies:

A Glenbard Graduate:

- Collaborates
- Communicates
- Thinks Critically
- Embraces Diversity
- Creates
- Is Self-Empowered

Each of the six competencies is accompanied by descriptions of that particular attribute. The descriptions were developed by department chairs from each of our schools, along with school and district administrators. We worked through several iterations and used resources from EdLeader21, a national network of educators implementing competencies into their systems.

Let's look at the descriptions that accompany communicates:

- · Demonstrates and works to develop an understanding of audience and self
- Adapts message, style and tone to the chosen medium, audience, and purpose
- Utilizes clear, concise, and effective oral and written communication
- Listens actively and responds with empathy and respect
- Initiates and sustains meaningful conversation in a variety of settings

Here are a few examples of what communication looks like in the classroom:

- · High-level questioning and discussion
- Debate activity
- Interviews & introductions
- Presentations
- Research projects
- Video production, blogs and podcasts
- Literature reviews

Good communication skills are essential in all areas of life - personal and professional. Communication is more than speaking and writing; active listening, interpreting visuals and understanding nonverbal cues also are key communication skills.

You likely hear educators say we are preparing students for jobs that don't exist yet. No matter what our students do after high school, we are equipping them with the communication skills they need to be successful.

As we move forward with our Profile of a Graduate, we are defining a greater purpose in curriculum and assessment outcomes and refining competency descriptors by subject area.

Thursday, October 17th from 6:30-8:00 PM at Glenbard North High School. A resource fair will take place prior to the event from 6:00-6:30 PM.

ABOUT THE PRESENTION:

Your Choice to Live, Inc. will be presenting <u>Wake Up Call</u>, a substance abuse educational program. The program begins with information about current drug trends such as vaping, marijuana, alcohol and prescription pills. Next, attendees are walked through a life-size teen bedroom with more than 20 "red flags" that can signal drug or alcohol use. The bedroom identifies spots where drugs can be hidden, household items that can be used as drug paraphernalia and ways teens try to cover up drug and alcohol use. Lastly, attendees will learn practical prevention strategies to prevent substance abuse and where to go for help if they are concerned. Attendees will also receive a <u>Wake Up Call Handbook</u>, a30+ page comprehensive resource guide with current drugs trends, signs of abuse, hiding places and relevant paraphernalia, parenting tips and resources all in one place.

Our goal is to educate parents, teachers, community members and other adults who are influential in the lives of youth so they know what seemingly innocent items can be an indication of substance abuse.

ABOUT THE PRESENTERS:

<u>Sandi Lybert</u>, Founder Your Choice to Live, Inc - Sandi's personal experience with her son, Tyler's addiction and her passion for helping others led her to leave her career in banking to start Your Choice to Live, Inc. In 2017, Sandi was named the Waukesha County Champion of the Year for her efforts to promote and improve the quality of life in Waukesha County.

Ashleigh Nowakowski, Executive Director, Your Choice to Live, Inc. - Ashleigh Nowakowski has been working in the substance abuse prevention field since 2009. Her work includes speaking in middle and high schools, teaching in health classes, and working with high risk youth in the Detour program. Ashleigh also has experience working with youth who are concerned about a loved one's substance use. Ashleigh has her Master's degree in Public Administration.

WHY ATTEND THIS PRESENTATION:

Schools across the Midwest report that vaping and marijuana devices are the two most common contraband items students are getting caught with in school.

Across the United States, e-cigarette use, also known as vaping, is reaching epidemic proportions among teenagers. According to the <u>American Lung Association</u>, more than 3.6 million U.S. middle and high school students have reported using e-cigarettes in the past 30 days.

There are many health concerns with e-cigarette use. Although some don't contain nicotine, ecigarette juices use liquid nicotine extracted from tobacco and can contain as much nicotine as an entire pack of cigarettes. There are also concerns about increased exposure to toxins, including heavy metals, chemical compounds, and other fine particles that may get absorbed into the lung. Additionally, e-cigarettes can be used as a delivery system for other drugs.

According to the Surgeon General's health advisory, about one third of middle and high school students who used e-cigarettes used them as a delivery device for marijuana. A study released in <u>September 2018</u>, reported two million middle and high school students vaping marijuana; equivalent to 1 out of 11 students. Health officials are concerned about this growing trend "because cannabis use among youth can adversely affect learning and memory and may impair later academic achievement and education."

With the development of technology, kids have more access to information than ever before. If a person wants to get "high", all they have to do is search the internet. Drug deals are continuously conducted on social media apps such as snapchat. As parents, it's hard to keep up with all the latest trends. This presentation will address these issues as well as give practical advice on how to prevent use and keep children substance free. Research shows that teens who consistently learn about the risks of drug use from their parents are up to 50% less likely to use substances.
